Your Safe Drinking Water Projects: A Race Against Time, Uphill, with a Handicap

A little over 12 years ago, I started my career at Carpinteria Valley Water District with the admonition that anything I tried to do here would be very difficult because of the projected impacts on the water rates due to the high cost of State Water. How true this has been.

Within six months of my arrival, it became clear to me that major expensive capital improvements were going to be necessary to modernize our 1950's constructed water system to meet the ever more stringent safe drinking water standards mandated by the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency and the California Department of Health Services. I realized that, like it or not, we were in a race against time to build the projects to enable the District to stay ahead of boil water orders and mass mailings to customers about unsafe drinking water and failure to meet disinfection byproduct standards.

To make a long story short, your Board of Directors, making the difficult decisions, in 1998 embraced the necessity of new expenditures adding to the water rates, on top of already steep State Water rate hikes. It has been difficult to convince many members of the public of the necessity. With one recent exception of a public notice about a disinfection byproduct standard failure, there have been no bad experiences to allow the public to realize or experience the gravity of our safe drinking water problem. There has been no issuance of a boil water order. And notices about "long term adverse health risks" caused by "disinfection byproducts" just do not seem to resonate as a serious public health issue.

Please know that the District remains committed to reach out to you, customers of the District, to help you understand what you need to know about the District's costly and successful efforts to ensure that your water is safe to drink. I believe you can and should be confident in the performance of your water district. Accordingly, the District is planning a major public outreach event about the completion of its safe drinking water projects in late September. In the mean-time, please call me directly at (805) 684-2816 with concerns or questions and without hesitation, I will make whatever time is necessary to respond.

CVWD and Fire Protection

Although summer brings fun-filled days at the beach and backyard barbecues, the recent Angora Fire in South Lake Tahoe and, closer to home, the Rancho Wildland Fire in the Los Padres Forest are reminders of the importance of fire protection. Carpinteria Valley is in a high fire zone and susceptible to the ravages of fire. Summer is also fire season.

Carpinteria Valley Water District (CVWD) plays a major role in fire suppression through the installation and maintenance of approximately four hundred fire hydrants within its jurisdiction. The CVWD Operations and Maintenance department has been working diligently to remove old dry-barrel fire hydrants installed in the late 1950's and early 1960's. These older hydrants were identified as potential hazards during fire fighting due to inoperable valves and weak parts that could break during operation. Between 2005 through June 2007, the District has removed approximately forty dry-barrel hydrants using adapters and installed modern wet-barrel hydrants. Another eight dry-barrel hydrants will be replaced during fiscal year 2007-2008.
